OTEY IS ON THE MOVE

IN PREPARATION for the building of our new parish house, we must vacate the existing building. The current deadline is August 31, however we are told that this could change if the start date is moved up.

The first office to move out of the parish house was the Financial Secretary, Lisa Rung. On May 6 we moved her essential files, her computer and furniture to a small room upstairs in Brooks Hall. Her phone number is 598-5997.

On June 13, the Rector's and Parish Secretary's were relocated to their new homes in Brooks Hall. These offices will remain in Brooks Hall permanently. Some structural modifications will be necessary to make these offices efficient, but we are delaying these for a time while everyone settles into the new space and determines what is needed. Their phone number, 598-5926 moved with them. We also added an additional phone line: 598-9537. The Rector's office is in the old dining room while the secretary's office is in the front parlor on your right as you enter the front door..

We have also moved the conference room across the hall to the front parlor on the ramp side of the building. It is a bit cramped with that large table and twelve chairs, but this is temporary until the new parish house is completed. The small office space adjoining this parlor can be used by the Rector for meetings or for other small groups.

The Recovery Programs that meet in the parish hall will meet in Brooks Hall. Also housed in Brooks Hall will be the Godly Play classes. They will meet in the three upstairs rooms in Brooks Hall. Fire on the Mountain will have the use of the entire upper level for their Sunday evening meetings. We are still considering where to put the adult classes on Sunday mornings. One will be in the Brooks Hall conference room. The nursery will be in some combination of the hallway and the offices in Brooks.

Folks at Home has moved down University to the building that belongs to the Sewanee Trust for Historic Preservation, commonly called the Blue House. This is a temporary move and they will have office and storage space in our new parish house

**UPDATE FROM THE PARISH HOUSE
CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE
JUNE 21, 2012**

We have received detailed design plans from our architects and a site plan from our civil engineer which are posted on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall. Our builder, American Constructors, is in the process of pricing the construction based on bids from sub-contractors and we have furnished the company with names of several local contractors and suppliers in an effort to manage costs. The builder has requested us for additional time to prepare cost estimates and we have agreed to meet here on July 6th to review the cost information. The next step will be a “value engineering” phase during which time we will make cost related decisions.

Barbara Prunty has agreed to chair our Décor Advisory Committee and to become a member of the Construction Committee. To date, Ken Taylor, Karen Keele, Debbie Ball and Peggy Peterson have agreed to join Barbara on her committee. This committee will go into action once we have cost information and begin making decisions on materials, colors, fixtures, and space utilization.

We have selected a bank to finance the construction of the Parish House and the proposal is being presented to the Vestry for approval. The interest rate is very favorable and the bank does not require our buildings as collateral, a significant benefit.

The Diocese has reviewed our building and financing plans and we understand that no further action is required from us.

We have submitted the building and site plans to the University’s Lease Committee. Our project has been approved subject to the Committee’s final approval of exterior materials.

There are many moving parts to this project and we continually have to remind ourselves that we are in a planning process and that the level of activity ebbs and flows. At the moment, it might seem like not much is happening, but a lot of activity is going on behind the scenes to get us ready for

construction to begin. Given the above delay in costing the project we have asked the architect if the target construction start date of September 24th is realistic. They initially indicated “yes” but they are revisiting the timeline and we will let you know their response. Please contact any one of the Construction Committee members should you have any question. OTEY IS ON THE MOVE...CONTINUED

Upcoming moves include The Sewanee Children’s Center and the CAC. The Sewanee Children’s Center received official approval from the University for relocation to Lower Cravens Hall. SCC will hold their summer program (June 4-August 3) in their existing space in the parish house and be moved and ready for fall in Cravens. However, the move will be more costly than anyone would have desired because of the cost of modifications to satisfy the requirements of the Fire Marshal’s office. This is a blow to the SCC, but they will find a way to make the move to Lower Cravens successfully. The CAC will be moving to the yellow house at 58 Lake O’Donnell Road. This is the yellow house adjacent to the Senior Center.

Thurmond Library will remain in the parish house through the summer. A possible plan is to move the children’s books to Lower Cravens with the SCC and the adult books to a room in the Blue House with Folks at Home, but other options are being considered.

The Episcopal Church Women will meet at Lorena’s for their monthly luncheons next year.

Also, we are in need of canners, both hot water and pressure, strainers, etc. If you are able to donate them, that is great, however we will also be making a list so that we know who has them to borrow when the time comes.

We are hoping that this will become a community project, so anyone is welcome to come and share their knowledge and take part.
