A couple of weeks ago, I spent an afternoon with Betty Barton Blythe, Father Dennis and Sandy Kezar (new members of Otey who you need to get to know), and their guest, Sister Elissea Papaciok. Sister Elissea is a Romanian Orthodox nun who is a splendid artist, practicing the ancient art of iconography. She was delightful. Sister Elissea made her first visit to America at the invitation of the Smithsonian Museum. Her work has been displayed at the Vatican and museums in the United States

and Europe (say "wow" whenever you'd like!).

During the day, she met with undergrads, seminarians, and all of us who were interested. At the risk of oversimplifying, her icons took one's



breath away. Icons of the Madonna and Child, of Christ, and, of course, of angels. Michael, Raphael, Gabriel, Uriel - I loved the icons of the angels.

We in Sewanee think we own the franchise on angels. We tap the inside top of our cars as we enter the domain to let our angels know

we no longer need their care, and tap it again as we leave to let them know we need them back on duty (although, as I explain to Bobbye, I never tap, as I need my angel as much in Sewanee as I do outside of Sewanee.) We have angels on our mugs and on pins in our lapels. Yet, many think of angels as fanciful beings.



They aren't. Angels are real. As our Prayer Book puts it, when we sing the Sanctus during the Holy Eucharist, we join our voices with the voices of angels and Archangels who forever proclaim the glory of God's name. We cannot begin to understand angels. Down through history, notable theologians have tried—Augustine, Ambrose, Aquinas, Origen, and Tertulian, to name just a few. But Angels are real. Angels are part of that reality which is God, a reality that seems just beyond the horizon. Angels are part of that reality which we can't quite reach.

As so many of us go in different directions during the summer months, I pray that your angels will take good care of you as you travel, and bring you safely back to the mountain soon. And for those of you beginning new adventures away from our mountain, may your angels keep you safe and well until we meet again.

CHECK LIST

... THERE'S MORE TO ITTHAN MEETS THE EYE!

As you may have noticed, a member of the Otey vestry stands during the announcements at every service and welcomes the congregation, especially visitors. The vestry members think this is an important outreach tool for the many who attend our services. But behind the scenes, this person doesn't just welcome people to the parish.

Each week the one on duty arrives just after 8:00 and picks up a 4-page checklist. The condition of all three of our buildings and the grounds is inspected. This is needed because our cleaning team works before the buildings are used on Saturdays. A walk-through and inspection to correct (if necessary) and check off each item takes about half an hour. (This could be longer in the winter if there is snow or ice to deal with!) All the bathrooms are especially inspected for adequate supplies and cleanliness.

Light bulbs are changed and trashcans are emptied. Then the vestryman/woman attends both services, stays for the coffee hour that follows, and assists where necessary. Finally, when the last car has left the parking lot, he/she makes sure the coffee pots are unplugged, the doors are closed, and the lights turned off.

Thanks to these volunteers, we can rest assured that things will run smoothly each Sunday. You can help, too, by notifying the Vestry Member of the Day about anything in the buildings or on the grounds that you see amiss on Sunday mornings.

FOLKS @ HOMES MAKES MOVE TO 400 UNIVERSITY AVE.

In anticipation of the Otey Parish House renovation, Folks at Home (F@H), a sponsored project of Otey Memorial Parish since 2008, will be re-locating by the end of May, 2012. Our new location is the historic Blue House, 400 University Ave., where we'll join the current tenant, the Sewanee Trust for Historic Preservation. F@H began a support group in March for people who are in a caring role for their parent/s, spouse/mate, friend or relative. This group meets every week and is open to anyone with the desire to participate. Support groups often offer a confidential, safe, and nurturing environment to share personal frustrations, joys, sorrows, and wisdom with individuals who may share similar challenges in their care team. Please call or email for details on the meeting time and location.



F@H provides information, referrals to service providers, sets up interviews, and assists with the coordination of access to care. F@H has safety equipment available for your use: bath/shower chairs, wheelchairs, etc. Grab bars and handrails are also available for installation in your home.

Community volunteers make weekly home visits, shop for groceries, keep in contact by phone, provide transportation to medical appointments, and facilitate the weekly F@H support group. It truly takes a village to make the F@H village model a success.
