From the Rector: Follow-up of General Convention

There is much to write about the accomplishments of last month's General Convention of the Episcopal Church. Of the hundreds of resolutions considered by convention, the one that gained the most attention had to do with same-sex marriage. As you may remember, in 2015 trial liturgies for same-sex marriage were made available to the church in all dioceses whose bishops allowed it. Our own Bishop Bauerschmidt was

among 8 bishops who did not, making alternate arrangements with another diocese as General Convention required. At diocesan convention earlier this year, it was clear that many members of our diocese wanted access to same-sex marriage in their own parishes; indeed, Otey's vestry was among those co-sponsoring the proposal.

Convention did what I consider, on the whole, a good job in making same-sex marriages available in every diocese, while respecting the consciences of those who oppose it. The tradition is maintained that clergy have the prerogative to decline to officiate at any marriage, and in those cases when the involvement of a bishop is needed, such as remarriage after divorce, bishops opposed to same-sex marriage can delegate that responsibility to another bishop.

A number of resolutions were adopted related to the #MeToo movement, proposed by the Special Committee on Sexual Harassment and Exploitation, and others. The House of Bishops adopted a document entitled, "A Working Covenant for the Practice of Equity and Justice for All in The Episcopal Church." Revision of the Book of Common Prayer was not begun by this convention, but additional liturgical options were made available. Many resolutions addressed various aspects of the care of creation. An emotional highlight of convention was the re-admission of Cuba to the Episcopal Church after more than 50 years.

A Rector's Forum this fall, will be a conversation about General Convention, including these and other topics it addressed. I hope you will be in attendance.

Brad believes the Church has the unique opportunity to witness to a different way of being Christian—one that not only takes following Jesus seriously, but also is open to the new things the Holy Spirit is up to in the world. Brad, Michelle, and Abby have worshipped at Otey a good deal since coming to Sewanee in January 2017, so you may already know them. In any event, please welcome Brad in his new role!

The Adult Forum, 2018-19

The theme for the forthcoming series of presentations at the Adult Forum at Otey is exciting. We will be hearing and thinking about not only what is new in Christian thought and experience, but where these tendencies are likely to lead in the years immediately ahead. Questions and discussion will be invited at each of the presentations. With exchanges between engaged speakers and hearers new insights are likely to emerge.

The series will begin with a discussion of the summer reading, Rebecca Skloot's *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks*. Whether you have finished or are still in the process of reading this book, this session is sure to raise important questions. This session will be followed by a presentation the next week on the meanings of Madeleine L'Engels's *A Wrinkle in Time*. Participants will focus on what was discovered in the VB-uS program early in the summer. During the following months we will consider Christian preaching appropriate to the time in which we live—also poets, theologians, and leaders who are important for our apprehension of the faith. We will continue our earlier focus on science and religion. At the end of the fall season, with the coming of Christmas, the nature, role, and continuing presence of our Savior Christ will be the focus of our minds and hearts. These attributes will be seen in the light of the teachings of the Hebrew prophets.

The winter and spring of 2019 will be devoted to activities and programs aimed at the world near at hand: the Episcopal Church's worship; the practice of citizenship both in Africa and here in the U.S.; the environmental crisis; the continuing appeal of C. S. Lewis across denominational lines; and the attention now being given to slavery, racism, and reconciliation, especially in this region. We will also hear about the origins and prospects of Southern religion; St. Andrew's-Sewanee School and its role in the life of the Church; contemplative prayer as a path toward our own transformation; issues of life and death associated with the work of the Bishop Otey Society; and social and economic changes on the Cumberland Plateau. Our rector will introduce and/or continue subjects of discussion at regular intervals, and our bishop will speak at the end of the series.

All are welcome! The Adult Forum is held on most Sundays from the end of August to the beginning of May in St. Mark's Hall at Otey Memorial Parish from 10:00 to 10:50 a.m. There is coffee and tea provided by faithful volunteers.

Wed Sept.12-Oct24,10 til noon.

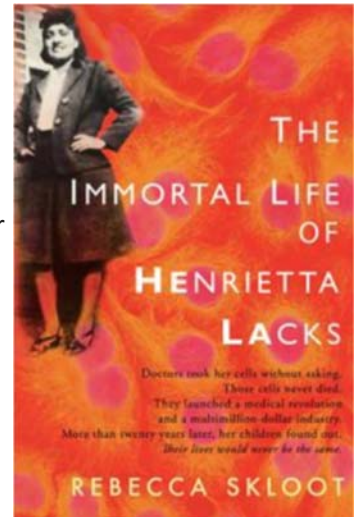

Otey Summer Book

This summer members and friends of Otey Parish are invited to read a book together. *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks* by Rebecca Skloot, tells the story of the poor black tobacco farmer whose cells were taken without her knowledge in 1951. Cells originating from hers have been used in developing the polio vaccine, cloning, gene mapping, and in vitro fertilization, all without compensation to her or her family.



Made into a movie on HBO last year, the award-winning book treats race, ethics and medicine in the context of the history of medical experiments on African Americans and the effect of such treatment on subsequent generations. *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks* is available in paperback, for e-readers, and as an audiobook and is suitable for teens as well as adults. We will discuss our responses at the first Adult Forum session on August 26, 10:00am.

Who is Leo Sowerby

One of the highlights of summer in Sewanee is Sewanee Church Music Conference week. For many years I was a fixture at that conference. Since coming to Sewanee and playing at Otey, it has become more difficult to attend the conference. But I still go to the Organ Recital in honor of Gerre Hancock and the Evensong. It gives me a chance to meet old friends and hear some wonderful music.

This year the organ recital featured the music of Leo Sowerby (1895 -1968). Stephen Buzar performed the Symphony in G and three other pieces on the fiftieth anniversary of Sowerby's death. After listening to the recital, I thought I would focus on the influence of Sowerby in church music this month.

There are two hymn in our hymnbook from Sowerby. Hymn 125 (PERRY) and hymn 305 (ROSEDALE). The first is a hymn for Epiphany on Isaiah 9:2 – 7 and the second is a Eucharistic Hymn. The second is more commonly used (“Come Risen Lord...”). In fact Sowerby was a prolific composer with over 500 works in every genre but opera and ballet. He was an outstanding teacher of composition with many well-known pupils. One of my former teachers was a graduate of his composition training and wrote many pieces for choir. He became concentrated in Liturgical Music when he worked in an Episcopal parish.

So who was Leo Salkeld Sowerby? He was born in Grand Rapids, Michigan on May 1, 1895. He began composing at age ten and became interested in organ when age 15. He was self taught on the instrument. His interest in composition began with Arthur Olaf Anderson at the American Conservatory in Chicago. In 1913 he wrote his Violin Concerto which was premiered in 1913 by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. He was a bandmaster during WWI in France. In 1921 he was awarded the Rome Prize from the American Academy in Rome. He was the first composer to receive this prize. He joined the American Conservatory of Music faculty in 1924. In 1944 he received the Pulitzer Prize in Music for his cantata, the Canticle of the Sun. This piece was written about the ministry of St. Francis of Assisi.

Sowerby became organist-choirmaster at St. James Episcopal Church in Chicago. Prior to that he served as associate organist at Fourth Presbyterian Church of Chicago. In 1955 St. James was consecrated the cathedral in Chicago. He served at St. James until his retirement in 1962. He was called to Washington National Cathedral to found the College of Church Musicians. He served in that post until 1968 Leo Sowerby died in Port Clinton, Ohio while at Camp WA-Li-Ro in Put-in-Bay, Ohio. This was a summer camp where he had taught for many years. He is buried in the National Cathedral, Washington, D.C. You can see why he was often called the “Dean of American church music.” Leo Sowerby was a tremendous contributor to church music, composition, and education. Now you know!
