From the Rector--Unity and Diversity

Last month I attended a wonderful concert in St. Luke's Chapel by the Belmont College Faculty Woodwind Quintet. Our own Rebecca Van de Ven is oboist of the quintet. As a trombonist I love the sound of my own instrument and of other brass instruments. I often listen to trombone quartets or trombone ensembles, and I have enjoyed listening to, and playing in, brass quintets. Yet as early as my college years, I recognized that there was something special about the sound of a woodwind quintet. I even voluntarily admitted to the crusty oboe professor that woodwind quintets sound better than brass quintets. The reason has to do with variety of tone colors or timbres (pronounced TAM-bers).

Brass instruments all make their sound the same way--by buzzing into a mouthpiece attached to a length of tubing ending in a flared bell. These instruments blend with one another in a tone with a fair amount of continuity from low notes to high. The five instruments in a woodwind quintet produce their sounds in a total of four different ways: the flute by blowing across a tone hole, oboe and bassoon by blowing a double reed, clarinet by blowing a single-reed mouthpiece, and French horn by buzzing into a brass mouthpiece. What's more, the oboe, clarinet, and bassoon are made of wood; the flute and French horn of metal.

Composers use this variety of timbres when writing for woodwind quintet; the times I find it most appealing are when the instruments play together in unison or chords. Then a composite tone color emerges--rich and complex, different from any one instrument, yet still unified. Similarly, pipe organs have a variety of stops to produce different timbres, not just to change volume. Paradoxically, the sound of the organ is clearest when different kinds of stops are used together, resulting in a satisfying richness of tone similar to the complexity of a woodwind quintet's.

Diversity is often viewed in one of two ways in our society. Some see diversity as a threat to consensus and unity, and believe that members of less-numerous groups should conform to the dominant way of doing things. Others see diversity as good in and of itself, and believe the majority group should do everything possible to encourage it. The example of the woodwind quintet demonstrates that unity and diversity can coexist fruitfully. If each instrumentalist were playing a different composition, or would refuse to stay together at the same tempo, the result would be anything but fruitful. But when the variety of instruments joins together in the same music, paying close attention to one another to stay together and blend their distinctive voices, then a distinctive and profound beauty emerges.

As Christians we can achieve unity not because we are all uniformly the same, but because we choose to listen to one another and to act in concert. This unity encompasses the diversity in which God made humankind, not erasing differences, but blending them into a magnificence that surpasses any one individual or group.

As I have been busy preparing for Christmas, I have been passing my cross stitch of the Serenity Prayer that is outside my office. I did it for my son-in-law as a gift. It is a very special prayer to anyone who has experienced a twelve step program. It has become very meaningful to me this year. I think all of us tend to labor over what could be. Unfortunately, that makes us not appreciate what is. I have been considering perhaps that not appreciating what God is sending us. We can always hope to do better, but we can't feel less by what we have. I know I have thought that about music. I wanted the program to be like my programs of the past instead of accepting with joy what the program is. What a waste of my time. And how does that look to God?

How much time we tend to spend laboring over something that is not really worth the effort. How much better could we spend that time bettering the ministry we have. A former priest I know loved golf. He used it frequently as a metaphor in his sermons. He used to say, "It isn't the preparation of the shot, but the follow through that matters." Sometimes people will want to step up for a project and sometimes they do. However, do they follow through? As a parish, each one of us comes with gifts and talents to give. As we approach the new year, if you have considered being a part of a group here at church and haven't acted on it, I challenge you to consider following through with it. Whether it is altar guild, acolyte, lay reading, music, teaching or folding bulletins, your service is important to God and to your church family. Children are not the only ones who can carry a torch or the cross in procession. I hope you feel encouraged to step up and try something new here at church this year. Maybe you have perceived a need that you feel you could address. Don't be afraid to come forward. Let's work to change all we can and accept those things we can't – at least not yet.

Let us be always thankful for all we have as a member of the family of Otey Parish. My best wishes for a blessed Christmas and safe holiday season. And may we shine with hope and love in 2020.

Crèche Service

Come to the Crèche, Christmas Eve at 4:00 p.m.

A crèche /kreSH/ is a scene depicting the birth of Christ. The idea of building these scenes is attributed to St. Francis. The first crèche service was held at an outdoor Midnight Mass, where according to St. Bonaventure, Francis set an actual manger and brought in an ox and a donkey.

At Otey, the Christmas Eve service includes a nativity scene built by children as the congregation sings Christmas songs. Otey's creche is a beautiful and traditional set – yet not easily breakable – including the Holy Family with their donkey, an ox for the stable, and a number of shepherds. One is a shepherdess. They arrive with their sheep, following an angel that one child must place, very carefully, at the top of the stable.

The magi come last, and they do not quite arrive on Christmas. They are still traveling. You'll notice them on a pedestal near the sacristy until Epiphany. A big thanks to Robin and Julia Bates, who graciously help each child place the pieces where they belong.

Please bring children 15 minutes early (3:45 p.m.) to select a crèche piece and receive instruction. Children will sit with their families until it is time to bring their person or animal to the cross. The children of Otey Parish, and children who visit relatives here in Sewanee, really enjoy participating in this beautiful service, which allows them to engage the story in a tangible way.



"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in" Matthew 25:35.

CAC does a pretty good job of living into those words and the work that we do is reflected in our actions on a daily basis. We feed families weekly, and once a month we have an open invitation for the entire Sewanee community to break bread with their neighbors at our Community Meal. Volunteers and Bonner Students keep things running smoothly week in and week out. Yes we distribute groceries on a weekly basis but CAC does so very much more. Poverty and food insecurity are real and CAC helps with housing, utilities, transportation, medical and dental needs and everything else that is related to basic human needs. It is through the generosity of others that this important work happens. The tutoring program held at St. James is now in our third year. Currently we have 10 tutors and 9-10 kids from K-5 come weekly to get help with their school work. Our efforts to expand into the Sherwood Community have produced positive results as we continue to explore the needs and ways CAC can help. The Angel Tree Project sponsored by All Saint's Chapel will help struggling families provide for their children. The food pantry brings people to us, volunteers and university students offer hospitality and then the work of the Holy Spirit begins. We look with hope into 2020.







2020 Budget

The Finance Committee and Vestry are in the process of developing the 2020 church budget. As always, we are considering our work in light of recent events in the life of the church, while looking to the future, which next year, will include a celebration of the 150th anniversary of the founding of our church.

During 2019, the Finance Committee and Vestry have made important and timely decisions about campus maintenance and repairs, some that were planned and some not. The bell tower repair project was an example of the former. We opened a line of credit to handle the financing and did not request special bell tower donations. In the height of the summer heat, we experienced multiple failures of HVAC systems requiring expensive repairs that were not planned. Fortunately, through prudent fiscal management, we had funds in reserve to handle this problem.

Now, as we consider the 2020 budget, we know that there are campus projects that need attention sooner rather than later, such as painting the exterior of Brooks Hall and partial repair of the church roof. Both of these projects together total approximately \$18,000. Fortunately, insurance will cover the bulk of the roof repairs. During the next month, we will be making decisions about how we balance the needs of the church with what is financially prudent. We have already removed some requested items from the budget and decreased others toward this goal. We are trying to avoid substantive cuts to program ministries both within and outside the church.

The Vestry is most grateful to all who have pledged and those considering pledges in support of the important work of Otey in the Sewanee community and beyond. As the Finance Committee and the Vestry deliberate the budget, first and foremost, we ask for your prayers. Also, we ask that you consider your personal stewardship. If you have made a pledge, thank you so much. We hope you will consider the possibility of adding to your anticipated giving and that you will inform the church of your intention. If you have not made a pledge, please do so considering the pressing needs of building maintenance and repairs, and support of our many ministries.


