[The Transfiguration is] when we remember how the Disciples, even before they went to Jerusalem to face his trials with him, had a glimpse of Christ in his true glory. The Transfiguration is . . . remembered just before Lent, which is a good time for it . . . as I believe the glimpse of glory in Christ they saw on the mount of the Transfiguration was given in order to sustain the disciples through darkness of Good Friday. Indeed it is for a disciple, looking back at the transfiguration from Good Friday, that I have voiced the poem.

*For that one moment, ‘in and out of time,’
On that one mountain where all moments meet,
The daily veil that covers the sublime
In darkling glass fell dazzled at his feet.
There were no angels full of eyes and wings
Just living glory full of truth and grace.
The Love that dances at the heart of things
Shone out upon us from a human face
And to that light the light in us leaped up,
We felt it quicken somewhere deep within,
A sudden blaze of long-extinguished hope
Trembled and tingled through the tender skin.
Nor can this blackened sky, this darkened scar
Eclipse that glimpse of how things really are.*

FIRE ON THE MOUNTAIN HEARS NEWS FROM OCETI SAKOWIN

"It's hard to say I'm sorry, when you've been mistreated for five hundred years." Yet that is what Frank and Rochelle Bullhead said to the police and mercenaries at Standing Rock. "I'm sorry, and I forgive you, and I love you." Frank Bullhead said some took off their badges, and one of the pipeline workers became a water protector and brought his family to the camp.



Bullhead told us this story after handing Fire on the Mountain students a rubber bullet shot at his wife Rochelle. He protected her with his body.

Since our first Fire on the Mountain meeting of 2017 took place the day before Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, we talked about the importance of MLK Day and ongoing challenges to racial justice today. Then we walked down to the American Legion Hall to help set up tables and chairs for the cultural program and community potluck, called

Standing Rock: News from Oceti Sakowin.

Frank and Rochelle Bullhead have often stood in the front lines at Standing Rock. We met their daughter Mimi, with baby Dawson, and Mimi's husband Isaac Weston who was Head of camp at Oceti Sakowin, and Isaac's brother.



Stories from Standing Rock center on the importance of prayer, and the deep faith of listening. As Isaac Weston shared his own story, we were moved by his belief that prayer is always answered – not always with miracles on God's part, but often with a sense of mission or a new direction.

What is needed, may not be what one expects. Weston said that when the Dakota, Nakota and Lakota people gathered to pray about the Dakota pipeline, one of the responses from Creator was that they must "bring back the women." He said western civilization had taught them to treat women as second class and to look the other way when women and children were hurt. "That prayer taught us to bring back the women. Bring back our old way of life, where the women were held as highest sacred entity, because they do what men cannot do; they bring life."

Another powerful testimony came from Rochelle Bullhead, who stood before us wearing a dress of pennies. She explained what her grandfather told her: The pennies were for Abraham Lincoln. Though he freed black slaves through the Emancipation Proclamation, he also oversaw the largest public execution in the United States, in which 38 starving Dakota men were hanged on a single platform.



Rochelle Bullhead was calm, almost stoic, as she spoke about the need to protect the water that gives life to her people, and ultimately millions more.

"I would die for the water," she said, and then she pointed out the baby in her young daughter-in-law's arms. "These are my children. That is my first grandchild she is holding. I would die for them." She looked back at us and said, "I would die for you."
