Lamborn Called as Otey Rector

The vestry of Otey Memorial Parish is pleased to announce that its new rector will be the Rev. Dr. Robert C. Lamborn. The news was reported to the congregation on June 28.

“I am very excited to be undertaking shared ministry with this active, thoughtful, and uniquely situated congregation,” Lamborn said. “This is a welcome homecoming for my wife and me, and we are confident our daughter will flourish here.” Lamborn will begin at Otey on August 17.

“We are delighted that Rob will be joining us at Otey Parish,” said senior warden Steve Ford. “With the opening of the renovated and expanded Claiborne Parish House and the energy of our congregation, we are poised for a new chapter in Otey’s rich history in this community.”

Lamborn most recently has been serving as interim rector at St. James the Less Episcopal Church in Scarsdale, New York. For close to eight years (2004–2012) he was rector at Christ Church Riverdale in the Bronx, where he led a campaign to add handicapped accessibility, build a new pipe organ, and address decades of deferred maintenance on the historic property. He was rector at St. John’s Episcopal Church in Crawfordsville, Indiana 1996–2004. The chief area of growth during his service at St. John’s was Christian Education, including implementation of Godly Play and the Rite 13/Journey to Adulthood program.



Lamborn is a 1994 graduate of the School of Theology in Sewanee where he earned a Master of Divinity degree. He earned a Bachelor of Music, summa cum laude, in 1987 from University of Georgia. Before coming to Sewanee for seminary, he was in a Ph.D. program in musicology at Indiana University. He earned a Doctor of Ministry in Ministry Development in 2007 from Virginia Theological Seminary. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1995.

While in seminary, Rob met Amy Bentley, also a student at the School of Theology. They married and have a daughter, Caroline. Amy is also an Episcopal priest, and holds the Ph.D in Psychiatry and Religion from Union Theological Seminary, New York City. For the past four years she has been on the faculty at General Theological Seminary in New York.

“We offer our thanks to the Search Committee for its fine work,” Ford said.

FAIREST LORD JESUS

...”Jesus, ...My Soul's Glory, Joy and Crown...”

This month we are featuring hymn 383, FAIREST LORD JESUS. Some of you may know it by the title, BEAUTIFUL SAVIOR which is the theme song for St. Olaf's College which is noted for its excellent music. The tune was originally a Silesian folk song from an unknown author. It came to us from the German Jesuits and first appeared in 1677 in a Jesuit hymnbook titled, MUNSTER GESAMGBUCH. The text of the hymn was in existence at least fifteen years earlier and was found in a manuscript from 1662. It was only three stanzas at that time. In 1873, Lutheran pastor Joseph Seiss wrote and published a fourth stanza.

The hymn is an adoration of Jesus and how he speaks to us through the beauty of nature. Here on the mountain we are keenly aware of the peace only available through exposure to nature. Even though we don't know anything about the author or their inspiration, we know the quality and inspiration derived through the hymn remains.

One of most interesting parts of the hymn occurs in verse two. It talks about Jesus making the woeful heart to sing. That word “woeful” from the old English, is defined as causing sorrow or misery, anguish or agony from a broken heart. There are many things that can cause woefulness. Loss of any kind through illness, grief, or pain of any cause. We don't talk about being woeful these days but it still very much exists in our souls. Jesus can change the pain into singing and raise our hope and trust in the future. Since the Holy Spirit was left to comfort us, involvement in nature testifies to its healing power.

The tune most associated with this text is called *St. Elizabeth*. It also is called the Crusaders' Hymn in some publications. There is a totally unfounded myth that said the German Crusaders originated the hymn on their way to the Holy Land. This is totally erroneous according to scholars. The Jesuits came about after the crusades and used it first in their order. The tune emerges in Franz Liszt's oratorio, *Legend of St. Elizabeth*, wherein the tune forms part of the Crusader's March. There is not evidence of the tune prior to 1842, when the hymn appeared in *Schlesische Volkslieder* published by August Heinrich Hoffman von Fallersleben and Ernst Richter. The tune was called *Schonster Herr Jesu*, (Most beautiful Lord Jesus). In 1850 a Danish hymn writer B.S. Ingemann wrote *Dejlig Er Jorden* which he set to the same melody. It was translated into English and published as *Fair Is Creation*. Apart from their musical setting, the Danish and German lyrics are unrelated.

The hymn has been published in 492 hymnals and is truly one of the favorites in our hymnody. There is a second setting for the text on page 384 in the hymnal. It is a lesser known setting. The text is reminiscent of the praise King David expressed in Psalm 27: verse 4. “One thing have I asked of the Lord, that will I seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the Lord.” ---And so don't we all!

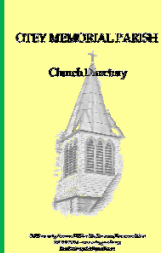
