

In the holy season of Lent we return to the basics—of Christian faith and of who we are as human beings. "Human" itself alludes to the dust or soil (humus) Ash Wednesday reminds us comprises our bodies and is their destination after death. Lent is a time to look our mortality square in the face, and to renew the spiritual practices that connect us with the God who gives us our very existence and draws us close in Jesus Christ.

- For individuals and families at home, we will again make available the **Lenten posters** that offer a brief reflection or suggestion each day.
- Regularly scheduled **Morning Prayer** (Mon-Fri at 7:30am) and Evening Prayer (Mon-Thur [and sometimes Fridays] at 4:30pm) are modest in duration, yet spiritually significant experiences for those who take part.
- The **Centering Prayer** group, facilitated by Jennifer Michael, continues at 7:00 pm on Mondays.
  - Morning and Evening Prayer, and Centering Prayer, will all take place in St. Paul's-on-the-Mountain Chapel in Claiborne Parish House during Lent.
- We will again hold the popular **weekday celebration of Eucharist** in the church on Tuesdays, February 16-March 15 at 12:15pm. These services will feature a different guest preacher each week, and prayers for healing with those who wish to remain afterward.

**Lenten Reflections** will focus on a practice at the heart of Christian faith this year, using the book *Forgiven and Forgiving*, by L. William Countryman (available in both paperback and Kindle formats, and there is a copy in the duPont Library).

"Only the strong can forgive. God, who is strongest, forgives best," Countryman writes. Once we truly understand the depths of God's love for us and know deep-down that we are forgiven, we begin to see the world anew through God's eyes. Only when we are able to accept God's forgiveness for ourselves can we offer forgiveness to others. Biblically based with sound academic research, yet written in a conversational style, *Forgiven and Forgiving* offers valuable insights for clergy, laity, and church study groups. Countryman is an Episcopal priest and retired professor of New Testament.

There are three **ways to participate** in the Lenten reflections:

- A brown bag lunch and discussion at 1pm Tuesdays, February 16 through March 15 (immediately after the 12:15pm service) in Claiborne's Adult Education Room.
- Soup and Reflection at 6pm Wednesdays, Febuary 17-March 16 in St. Mark's.
- Reading the book if you are unable to attend one of the sessions.

One of the reasons I felt drawn to Otey was the culture valuing matters of spirituality and faith development. I look forward to walking with you through these forty days of prayerful discovery.

#### ECW Special Meeting February 1



ECW co-presidents, Marcia Mary Cook and Susan Holmes, have announced a special meeting of ECW on Feb. 1 to hear The Rev. Dr. Robert MacSwain, Associate Professor of Theology at the University of the South. Dr. MacSwain will discuss the recent Primates' Meeting of the Anglican

Communion, held in Canterbury, England, from January 11 -15. What are the implications of this meeting for the Episcopal Church? Dr. MacSwain was research assistant to Archbishop George Carey at Lambeth Palace, London, in 2000-01, and is a priest canonically resident in the Episcopal Diocese of East Carolina.

The luncheon meeting will take place at noon in St. Mark's Hall of Otey Parish Claiborne Parish House. Folks at Home has made a long-term loan of a conference table and chairs for the adult education room, freeing up the current dining table and chairs there to return to the once-and-future dining room in Brooks Hall currently housing Rector Rob Lamborn. A door will be installed between the new offices of Rob and Parish Administrator Frieda Gipson (framing was provided inside this wall during construction of Claiborne to allow for such a door in the future). Once that step is complete, Rob, Frieda, and Diane will all move to Claiborne, and Kathy will move to Brooks (if she hasn't already). Thanks go to the "Friday Guys" construction crew led by Mickey Suarez, to contractor Bill Mauzy, and to the family who made a donation to cover the costs of this move.

#### CLAIBORNE PARISH HOUSE LOAN PROGRESS

Last month your designated debt reduction payments and continued Phase II capital campaign contributions allowed Otey to make another \$50,000 payment toward the principal of our loan. Through a combination of debt reduction payments and the principal portion of our regularly-budgeted monthly payments, our loan balance has declined from an initial \$682,088 as of September 1, 2014 to \$481,532 as of February 1, 2016. Every reduction in our loan balance helps our operating budget by reducing the interest portion of our monthly payment. (Currently the operating budget is stretched to the point of not funding the vacant position of Director of Christian Education and paying only 70% of our diocesan assessment.) Congratulations and please keep those gifts and pledge payments flowing so that we can make another \$50,000 payment toward principal this year!

#### "THE MEANING OF...?"

In Father Lamborn's sermon on January 17, he referred to a primate. This seemed like a good word on which to get the "official" definition:

#### **Primate**

The bishop with pastoral and administrative responsibility and authority for a group of dioceses that constitute a Church.—the Presiding Bishop in the case of the Episcopal Church, and the Archbishop of Canterbury in the case of the Church of England and the Anglican Communion. A primate is sometimes called a metropolitan.

In our December parish meeting there was discussion about where same sex marriages within the Episcopal church in Tennessee could be performed. Under set guidelines, these marriages may be performed in a peculiar...so what is a peculiar?

#### **Peculiar**

A peculiar is a chapel or church that is located within the diocese, but is not subject to the jurisdiction of its bishop. All Saints' Chapel is such a peculiar.

#### Bishop's Council

In some dioceses, Bishop and Council is the group which exercises all powers of the diocesan convention between meetings of the convention. It consists of the bishop; bishop coadjutor, if there is one; bishop suffragan, if there is one; and a designated number of clergy and lay persons. Bishop and council may not elect a bishop, may not amend the constitution and cannons of the diocese, may not take any action contrary to the actions of the convention, and may not elect any canonical officers of the diocese.

#### CLAIBORNE PARISH HOUSE KITCHEN ETIQUETTE

Our kitchen in Claiborne Parish House is shared by many different groups. In order to keep it clean for everyone, below are a few rules.

- 1. Leave it the way you found it, hopefully neat and clean
- 2. If you run out of anything, please note it on the shopping list on bulletin board.
- 3. Put all non-perishable opened food items securely wrapped and labeled in the "food" cabinet.
- 4. After your event, PLEASE take home all left over food, dishes, supplies. PLEASE DO NOT LEAVE PERISHABLE FOOD IN THE REFRIGERATOR EXPECTING THAT IT WILL BE USED BY SOMEONE ELSE.
- 5. Please wipe the stove and the counter tops.
- 6. Dishtowels: It would be greatly appreciated if you would take them home to wash and return them promptly. Keep in mind that the next group will need them and to find the dishtowel drawer empty is most inconvenient..
- 7. Table Cloths: If this has not been discussed before the event, it is expected that you will wash the cloths and return them promptly..
- 8. Coffee Pots: Please empty all pots and turn upside down on the mat beside the coffee maker. This is not a dish drain so please do not leave other cups, plates, dishes on this mat.
- 9. Coffee Cups: please store regular coffee cups (not mugs) in the basket kept on the window counter; mugs go in the cabinet next to the microwave; additional regular cups are in a basket in the pantry.
- 10. Paper/plastic supplies: A supply of napkins (various sizes), paper plates, plastic cups is in the drawers and cabinets below the window counter. Please use these before opening any new packages.
  - We want everyone to enjoy our beautiful kitchen. Thank you.
